## KILMALLOCK FIRE.

## Cork Brigade Man's Death.

Fireman Michael O'Connell, of the Cork Fire Brigade, died in Croom Hospital last night as the result of injuries received on Wednesday morning last at the fire in Kilmallock, when he and a number of other firemen were engaged in fighting the fames on the roof of the drapery premises of Messrs. Cahill, in Emmet-street. The front wall of the house collapsed, burying Firemen O'Connell and O'Leary beneath the debris, several hundreds of tons of which entombed them. Both firemen were extricated after some difficulty by their comrades and conveyed to Croom County Hospital, where they were under the treatment of Dr. O'Connor, who pronounced their condition It was found on examination most critical. that Fireman O'Connell, whose injuries were most severe, had a fractured leg and arm, and that he also sustained a fracture of four or five ribs, in addition to a fracture of the spine. He developed congestion of the lungs, and paralysis of the hip joints downwards subsequently set in. His condition was regarded as hopeless, but everything possible was done for him by Dr. O'Connor and the nursing staff of the hospital,

Fireman O'Connell was 31 years of age, and leaves a wife and three children to mourn his loss. He was a most efficient and courageous officer. The condition of Fireman O'Leary, also a married man, is slightly im-

The Inquest.

An inquest was held at the County Hospital, Croom, to day by Dr P. Clery, Coroner, on the body of the deceased.

Evidence was given by two witnesses from Kil-

mallock relating to the position in which the deceased was at the time he received his injuries. Dr Violet Madden, County Hospital, Croom, described the injuries sustained by the fireman, after which a verdiet of death from shock following these injuries was returned.

The remains were removed to Cork to-day. Captain D. Hogan, Limerick Fire Brigade, and one of his men proceeded to Croom this morning, and accompanied the remains to the Southern Capital, and will place a wreath on the bier.
