Well, the position of a referee was not one to be envied. The referee is the man in charge, the sole judge, and if he does wrong, if he is not fit for his job dm't have him again. But so long as he is a good sportsman, I am certain he will do nothing wrong. I am very strong about municularing the authority of the refuse." (Hear, hear.) In other institutions referees might have some trouble, but he could say, as far as the Irish Ragor Umon was con-cerned, the decision of the referre was a'ways accepted as final. (Hear, hear.)
