## DEATH OF MR WILLIAM CROMER.

We regret to record the death of Mr William X Cromer, which took place at his residence, Clifton Ville, Ennis Road, last Saturday evening, after a prolonged illness. Deceased, who was aged 57, was a member of an old Limerick family. He was son of the late Mr Conrad Cromer, jeweller, O'Connell street, in which business he, with his brothers, was engaged. He volunteered for service during the European War, and the result was to undermine his hitherto vigorous health. In his day he was prominent in athletics, and was one of the original members of the Protestant Young Men's Association Gymnastic Class. Of a very kindly and retiring disposition, with many other excellent traits of character, Mr Gromer was held in the highest regard and esteem by a wide circle of friends, who deeply regret his passing, though his demise was not unexpected.
