

Cardinal Van Rossum in London.

Writing last night, the London correspondent of the "Cork Examiner" says:—Cardinal Van Rossum, Cardinal Prefect of Propaganda, Rome, arrived here to-day, on his way to Limerick for the Diamond Jubilee celebrations of the Arch-Confraternity of the Holy Family, which take place next Monday. His Eminence came to London by way of Reykjavik, where he assisted last week at a special ceremony. He was preceded here by the Most Rev. Patrick Murray, Superior General of the Redemptorists, who arrived at St Mary's, Clapham, on Saturday evening, and who accompanies the Cardinal to Limerick. Both distinguished visitors are leaving for Chudleigh, Devon, where the Cardinal will hold a reception at the Convent of the Redemptoristine Nuns, which will be attended by the Abbot of Buckfast and Bishop Kiely, of Plymouth, who hails from Limerick. They are expected to reach Limerick on Friday, where they will be accorded a civic reception.

Inquests were not deemed necessary owing to both men dying from natural causes.
