CHILD'S FATAL BURN.

Kathleen Kennedy, aged a year and a half, succumbed in Barrington's Hospital yesterday morning to burns accidentally sustained on Saturday by falling into a tub of boiling water. At the time of the occurrence the mother, who lives in Windmill street, had only turned her back momentarily when she found the child in the water. The deceased was seriously burned on the back and head, and death was due to shock. An inquest was not considered necessary.

BOHERBUOY BAND.

This morning the Mayor (Mr M. Keyes), received a letter from Sir Charles Barrington, Bart, Hants, enclosing a subscription to help in defraying the expenses of the Boherbuoy Brass and Reed Band, which is competing in the musical contests of the Tailteann games in Dublin. The appeal made so far by the Citizens' Committee for funds has been well responded to, and on Friday evening in St Munchin's College grounds the public will be afforded an opportunity of hearing the Band play the test pieces set for the forthcoming festival.

IRISH LABOUR CONGRESS.

Mr W. McMullan, M.P, in his presidential address to the Irish Labour Party and Trades Union Congress, in Belfast, made some caustic comments on the Governments on both sides of the border.

One hundred and fifty delegates, from all parts of Ireland, attended, and were accorded a civic welcome by the Lord Mayor (Sir William Turner), who urged that many of the differences which hinder progress would disappear, and friendly co-operation take their place, if employers and employed worked together for the welfare of each.

Mr M. Courtney extended a welcome on behalf of the Belfast Labour Party, and Mr L. Gordon, T.C, welcomed the delegates on behalf of the Belfast Trades and Labour Council.

ANOTHER DROWNING.

A second tragedy, which created another painful sensation, is reported from Lisdoonvarna. A young boy, named John MacFarney, while picking berries at Doolin, about two miles from Lisdoonvarna, fell into a river and was drowned. The deceased was 12 years of age, and resided with his father and mother in a labourer's cottage at Ballycannon, Lisdoonvarna. The body was recovered about an hour after the tragedy had taken place. Arrangements have been made for the holding of an inquest.

THE EAST LIMERICK MURDER.

Notwithstanding the closest and most active enquiries and investigations the authorities have not up to the present succeeded in obtaining any clue that would lead to an arrest in connection with the murder of John Conhead, at Cahernarry, Ballyneety, on the morning of the 19th July. The Civic Guard officers detailed to investigate the crime have worked without intermission in an endeavour to trace its perpetrator or perpetrators, and have so far been baffled in the attempt. All last week a number of Guards were in the district, and it is learned without getting any nearer acquiring information that would give them something tangible to work upon.

KILMALLOCK ACCIDENTS.

Cyclists Collide—A Girl's Escape.

About a mile outside Kilmallock, on the road to Bruree, two cyclists collided. One, it is stated, carried a girl on the handle-bar, and she was rendered unconscious by the impact. She was put to bed in a neighbouring cottage and attended by priest and doctor. However, after some hours she was able to proceed homewards.

A woman seated on a donkey car was proceeding homewards from Kilmallock, when, observing a 'bus approach, she brought the donkey so far to one side that a wheel got into the channel, and she was thrown on to the footway, receiving injuries to the face and body.
