LIMERICK MAN DROWNED. LIMERICK

Bathing Fatality at Lahiach.

On Sunday evening prouds of holiday akers at Lahineh for the August Bank Holiday week-and were shocked by the news that one of their number had met his death by drowning. The victim was Michael Howard, aged about 26 years, and a native of Limerick, where he was employed by Messrs Spaights. Accompanied by a companion, Howard arrived at Lahinch in an early morning excursion train from Limerick." In the evening they went for a bathe as the tide was coming in. Unfortunately they went out at a point on the shore farther from the recognised bathing place for men. They were only in the sea a short time when Howard's companion found himself being carried away by a strong current. He made for the shore, and, sulthough a strong swim mer, experienced considerable difficulty in 2.7. reaching it. On his way in his passed. deceased, who did not appear to be in any difficulty. Knowing, however, that Howard was not a very good swimmer, he shouted at him to "get in," as there was a current ontside. Just as he reached the shore in an exhausted condition he heard Howard shout for help, and on looking back saw him go

A priest, who, it is stated, was a powerful swimmer, immediately struck out for the drowning man, but netwithstanding a vigilant search, failed to becate him. Two hours afterwards the dead body was washed up by the incoming tide, and was taken charge of by Sergeanst Liobbin, Lahinck Mrs Gallery, formerly a ms tron of the Clare Sanatorium, and Miss Powell, a nurse, tried artificial respiration but without any success-Lul results. Subsequently Dr D. Keanc. M. O., Ennistymon, arrived on the scene, and pro nounced life extinct. It is stated that the father and mother off the boy were on a holiday in Galway, whome ; hey heard the sad news. Deceased was unner rried

The remains reached the city last night by motor hearse, and were met outside the Borough boundary by a large concourse of mourners. They were conveyed to St. Michael's Chutch, where they rested overnight. This morning Requiem Mass was celebrated for the repose of the soul of the deceased, and the interment took place this evening in Mount St. Laurer are Cemetery in presences of a large attendance of citizens.

A young boy, named John Machaemey, while picking berries at Doolin, about two miles from Lisdonwana, fell into a river mid was drowned.
