Rev. Father Philip, O.F.M., was the of the Limerick Trades and Labour at a musical entertainment arranged honour by that body. In the course of his address he alluded to the formation of the Conciliation Board, of which he was a member, in the city some ago, and said in its deliberations he strove to be perfectly straight, and to that fact he attributed the success of the Board. He believed there was a glorious future for the Labour Party. His opinion was that the people of the city were sick and tired of politics, and that he was strengthened in his opinion that the future of the Labour Party was bright. The future of the Labour Party depended largely on the proposals to be submitted. They should be put forward for election men of the highest integrity, like the Mayor—men that they could look up to as right men. The Labour Party would not put forward a well-thought out proposal, one that would eliminate the spectre of unemployment. He stated that business men met weekly at the Rotary Club to discuss local problems from their point of view, and there was no reason, he said, why the workers at their meetings should not do likewise. He stated there was a great future before the Labour Party, and he could not see any reason why it should not rule the country in a short time. The reverend orator observed that he had always said, "Have the Red Flag by all means, but not the Red Flag of class hatred, but the Red Flag of class brotherhood—the Red Flag of Christ." (Applause).

James McQuane, President of the Trades and Labour Council presided, and the Mayor, Mr John Cronin, Mr James J. Larkin, Mr T. Casack, and Mr James Casey, extended a hearty welcome to the Rev. Philip.
