Patrick Carroll, Annaholty, Castleconnell, sued Thomas O'Donovan, a traveller, to recover £40 for loss and damage caused him in the negligent driving of a motor car on the 20th May last.

The plaintiff's case was that while driving a pony and trap in the direction of Birdhill two motor cars came along. The second, which was driven by the defendant, passed the first, swerved across the road, and ran into the pony and trap. In the impact the animal was injured in the head and legs, and the harness broken.

The defence was that there was no negligence or careless driving on the occasion. What occurred was that the steering gear snapped, with the result that he lost control of the car, which swerved across the road and ran into the ditch. The car never touched the pony or trap.

His Lordship held that the defendant was to blame, and gave a decree for £15 17s 6d, with three guineas costs.
