A deputation, for which the Very Rev Canon Godfrey, P.P., Cappamore, spoke, attended the meeting.

Canon Godfrey stated that the misery caused by the flooding in Cappamore was pitiable, and it was the duty of the County Council to see that steps were taken to repair the damage done. From time to time the people of Cappamore had to leave their homes owing to the recurrence of the flooding, and on this occasion they had suffered considerably. He urged on the County Council the absolute necessity of carrying out an extensive drainage system to obviate a recurrence of the flooding.

Mr M. Quinlan pointed out that the County Council had done everything possible to remedy what had been complained of. He said the flooding of Cappamore was not an affair of to-day or yesterday, but went back for years. The County Council had frequently called attention to the matter, and it was essentially the duty of the Government to carry out a system of drainage of all the valley of the river. This was, he said, a national and not a local question. He had reason to hope that as the result of representations recently to the Ministry of Lands that something would be done to prevent a recurrence of the flooding, and the consequent damage done to property.

DEATH OF DR. P. S. PEARSE.

We regret to announce the death of Dr. P. S. Pearse, which took place at his residence, 17 the Crescent, Limerick, yesterday. The sad news was unexpected in the City, though it was known he had been ailing for sometime past. Dr. Pearse was one of the oldest medical practitioners in Limerick, and was L.R.C.P. and S., Edinburgh, and L.F.P.S.G. He specialised in ophthalmia, and enjoyed an extensive practice, and in that capacity was also for a number of years Surgeon of St. John's Hospital. In former years he was civilian medical officer to the British Military forces quartered in Limerick. A man of a most courteous, kindly, and retiring disposition, he was held in the highest regard and esteem, and his premature demise has been heard of with deep regret by his professional colleagues, and by numerous friends in the city and elsewhere, who deeply sympathise with his widow in her bereavement. The funeral is announced to be private.
