Fire-fighting Appliances.

The necessity for replacing the existing fire-fighting appliances at the Fire Station has been under consideration by the Corporation for a rather inordinate length of time, without anything being done. In a city of the population of Limerick, with its valuable property, delay in furnishing the station with the most modern apparatus for combatting outbreaks of fire should not be brooked, and it is to be hoped that the Corporation will expedite the purchase of a new engine and escape, as well as an up-to-date motor ambulance. At last night's meeting of the Fire Brigade Committee some advance was made in this direction, and the citizens will expect that any negotiations made to substitute the existing equipment will meet with no further opposition, and that the subject will be grappled with forthwith.

DEATH OF COLONEL R. A. M. HENN

We regret to record the death of Colonel Richard Arthur Milton Henn, late Royal Artillery, which took place on the 28th instant at Camberley, Surrey. He was the fourth son of the late Thomas Rice Henn, Q.C., D.L., of Paradise, Kildysart, Co. Clare, and Recorder of Galway, and married Miss Heaton-Armstrong, daughter of the late Mr C. Heaton-Armstrong, of this city. The late Colonel Henn was held in high esteem and regard in Limerick and Clare. He was 74 years of age. His brother, Commander Henn, R.N., was the owner of the "Galathea."
