GUINNESS DIVIDEND.

The directors of Arthur Guinness, Son and Co, have declared an interim dividend on the Ordinary Stock of 15 per cent actual, less tax. This compares with 12 per cent actual, tax free, a year ago. This is the first time that the dividend on the Ordinary Stock is subject to deduction of income tax. Making allowance for this deduction at the rate of 4s in the pound, the present dividend is the same net as the interim last year. For the whole of the year ended June 30, 1928, the dividend was 24 per cent, plus a bonus of 4 per cent, or 28 per cent in all, tax free.

DOCTOR'S DEATH.

Kilmallock Man Passes Away in Glasgow.

A Kilmallock correspondent writes—The death took place suddenly on Monday of Dr Thomas J. Lyons, Glasgow. Deceased was a native of Kilmallock. He was educated at St. Munchin's, Limerick, and Cork College, and received his degrees in Dublin twenty years ago. He practised in Wales for a number of years, and later at Glasgow. In the course of the world war he was with the British troops at Mombasa for twelve months. On the cessation of hostilities he resumed practice at Glasgow. His death came as a shock to the people of Kilmallock, where his family are held in the highest esteem, and the utmost sympathy is extended to his wife, father, brothers and sisters in their great bereavement. The remains were brought to Kilmallock for interment.
