Complaints were reported through the following sources:—Reported by the general public, 7; reported by the police, 7; the Society's inspector, 7. Enquiries were made for other children in Limerick, Clare, and District.

revenue has fluctuated very considerably in recent weeks, the total received during the past three weeks was £2,183,648, or an average of nearly £728,000 per week.

The Budget estimate of expenditure for the year is £26,898,000 (which includes £2,235,337 "abnormal items"), so that with five weeks to run, the Minister has a margin of £5,218,357. Expenditure is, however, invariably very heavy in the closing weeks of the financial year. The estimated expenditure has been slightly increased, since the Budget was introduced by supplemental estimates.

The total receipts from all sources since April 1st now total £24,173,465, and the total issues £24,808,808, and the balance in the Exchequer is now reduced to £1,742,238. The heaviest charge on the "other issues" side is for the Shannon scheme, £1,354,450 having been paid since April 1st.
