HAMBURG-AMERIKA LINE PROFIT.

The report for 1928 of the Hamburg-Amerika Line shows a gross profit of 34,682,000 marks (approximately £1,734,000). In order to safeguard the extension of the company, it adds, and to keep it on its high standard, substantial sums had to be written off, necessitating the reduction of the dividend from the 8 per cent in 1927 to 7 per cent. At the end of the year seven passenger vessels and eight freight steamers were under construction.

DEATH OF MR. E. LANPHIER.

The death took place after an operation at a Dublin nursing home on Friday last of Mr Edwin Lanphier, who was for 46 years an official of the Bank of Ireland. He entered the service of the Bank of Ireland as a clerk at the Limerick branch on August 26, 1875, and was subsequently cashier at the Mountbellew, Bunnis, Mullingar, and Newry offices. He was agent at Boyle and other places, and retired on pension in 1921.
