Information of the discovery was given at the Civic Guard station, William street, and the remains were subsequently removed to the morgue of Barrington's Hospital.

Dr. W. P. Dundon, Resident Surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, stated in his evidence that the body was that of a fully developed male child, and had reached an advanced stage of decomposition. There were no marks of violence on the body, and as the result of a post mortem examination he arrived at the conclusion that the child was born alive, and that death occurred at least ten days ago. He was of opinion that the child died from want of medical attention at birth.
