DEATH OF MR. J. RYAN, KILLENURE.

We regret to announce the death, which
 occurred yesterday at his residence, Kil-
 lenure, Boher, of Mr John Ryan, a well-
 known and extensive agriculturist, and who
 for many years had been identified with
 local public life. He was in his 67th year,
 and at one time was a member of the old
 Limerick Board of Guardians and of the
 County Council. He was subsequently an
 Inspector of the Irish Land Commission,
 and in recent years was appointed Chairman
 of the Irish Associated Creameries. Mr
 Ryan was a man of broad viewpoint and of
 a very kindly and courteous disposition.
 His death has been heard of with sincere
 regret by numerous friends in Munster,
 whose sympathies are tendered to his rela-
 tives in their bereavement.

At their meeting yesterday the Board of
 the Irish Associated Creameries, Ltd., on
