The Show is, or will be, to the advantage of both city and county, and there should thus be a big attendance at next week's meeting to prove keen interest in the project, and to make the success that it is capable of being made with a united effort. We feel assured that nothing will be left undone by the energetic Executive to achieve the end. It is very satisfactory, indeed, to find a progressive revival movement on foot, considering that it is now many years since the Show was last held in Limerick City. One recalls the exhibits in all departments that were viewed at the Markets, and the big numbers of people who came from the adjoining counties, and indeed from various other parts of Ireland, including the Metropolis. In short, this annual Show was an important and highly interesting event in local social life and a material benefit to the city and county; and as the centre of an important horse and cattle breeding country, there is no reason why, with the hearty cooperation of the public, the coming Show could not prove in every way worthy of the best records. The last Show was held in Limerick so far back as 1914. The coming structure is to be held on the spacious grounds of the Limerick Race Company at Greenpark, where full accommodation will be provided for stabling and other purposes, while from a public viewpoint there could be no more attractive venue. Sub-Committees have been formed to deal with the various sections of the Show. The catalogue will comprise, besides horses and cattle, general agricultural exhibits, and the prize list, we learn, will be issued in the course of a few weeks. Offices have been taken at 16 Lower Cecil street, where all information may be obtained. The city, as well as the county, will gladly welcome the coming Show and wish the promoters every

It is quite probable that before election day there will be a couple of withdrawals, and that the contest will be a straight fight between Councillor Keyes and the nominee of either Fianna Fail or Cumann na nGaedheal.
