DEATH OF MR P. O'HALLORAN.

The death took place unexpectedly this morning at his home, Rathbane, of Mr Patrick O'Halloran. The deceased had been ailing during the past week, and was being medically attended. On the production of a medical certificate that death was due to cordiac failure, the Coroner did not consider an inquest necessary. Mr O'Halloran farmed extensively, and was for a number of years a member of Limerick Board of Guardians and No. 1 District Council.

LIMERICK MAN'S DEATH IN NEW YORK.

The death, following an operation, occurred in New York yesterday of Mr Michael MacMahon, in his sixtieth year. The deceased was second son of the late Mr and Mrs Andrew MacMahon, formerly of Eunis, and Barrington street, Limerick, and brother of Mr J. J. MacMahon, chemist, William street. Previous to going to the United States twenty years ago, Mr MacMahon held the position of manager at the late Mr Joseph Carmody's bakery establishment, Sarsfield street. At the time of his demise he was chief steward of the exclusive Bronx Club, where he was held in the highest esteem by the members. His death is a severe blow to the members of his family, with whom sincere sympathy will be extended in their bereavement.

NATIONAL TEACHERS VISIT TO SHANNON SCHEME.
