Kilrush, Monday-At all the churches in West Clare on Sunday the brutal murder of the late Detective O'Sullivan was strongly condemned-at first Mass in Kilmurry, Kilrush, by the Very Rev Dean McInerney, and by Rev Fr Meagher at the two subsequent Masses, who said he would not be surprised if the blood of the deceased cried to Heaven for vengeance on his assassin. It was a foul, brutal crime, the like of which the beasts of the field would not commit. It disgraced the name of not alone County Clare, but of Ireland.

At Cograciare Rev. Fr. Hehir and Rev. Fr. Salmen spoke strongly of the awful deed which had occurred in their midst recently.

Speaking at Kilmihill, Rev. Fr. Madden, Adm., also condemned the murder, as did Rev. Fr. Culligan at Kilmurry, and Rev. Fr. Enright, P.P., Knockerra.

Detectives and Guards are making active inquiries throughout the district, but up to the present no arress have been made.

Detective Driscoll and Guard Cusack are progressing most favourably, but are still suffering from severe shock.

#### MILITARY HUT BROKEN INTO.

A hut the property of the military authorities, situated on the Island Bank, was broken into between noon on Saturday and Sanday morning. From the appearance of the place it was evident that it was thoroughly ransacked and a quantity of tools taken away. Civic Guards have been engaged instituting enquiries into the affair, but up to the present no arrest has been effected.

# SUDDEN DEATH.

John Mitchell, aged sixty years, an inmate of the City Home, collapsed suddenly yesterday morning while walking through a passage in the institution, and died in a few minutes. The deceased had been an inmate of the Home for some years past, and was a native of the city. The resident medical officer having certified that death was due to cardiac failure, an inquest was not considered necessary.

# SHANNON SHOOTING INCIDENT.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE. Glue Yard Lane, off Sand Mall, Limerick, June 18th, 1929.

DEAR SIR,—Will you please insert in your issue of to-night's "Chronicle" a contradiction of the misleading report made to you, and which you published in your issue of the 15th inst., about the shooting of my father, Michael Clancy, in the vicinity of Landscape on the morning of the 15th inst. While coming down-stream, and through a narrow passage, through which the current runs swiftly, and with a loud noise in the silence of the night, shots were fired and my father was seriously wounded in the right arm. Possibly the water bailiffs may have called on the fishermen to halt; possibly the fishermen, even if they heard such a challenge, may have ignored this order. Water bailiffs are armed for self-protection. Are they authorised to use them otherwise? The British never authorised or winked at such methods. # FUNERAL OF LORD MUSKERRY

The funeral of Lord Muskerry took place on Saturday at his Irish seat, Springfield, The remains had near Dromcollogher. arrived at Charleville station the previous evening from England, and by motor hearse had been conveyed to the little church situated in the demesne, where they rested overnight. The funeral was of the simplest nature possible.

The Bishop of Limerick, Right Rev. Dr. White, and the Rev. P. J. Sweeney, Rector of Newcastle West, Killeedy, and Rathronand

officiated.

Within the church, where a short service was first held, was a wealth of flower floral tributes. There was a large attendance, some coming from long distances to pay their respects to a notable member of the Irish Peerage in his passing. Those included a big number of the villagers of Broadford and the surrounding districts, who held the late Lord Muskerry in very great esteem. His labours in the cause of seafarers was eloquently testified to by the fact that Capt Murray, Deputy Harbour Master, Cork, received a special commission from the Merchant Service Guild to represent them at the funeral, and to convey from the Guild magnificent wreath of natural flowers. The latter bore the following inscription:-A tribute from the officers of the Merchant

Navy, as represented by the Imperial Merchant Service Guild, in token of deep sorrow and of lasting gratitude on the magnificent services rendered to seafarers by their always true and sincere friend, the Right Hon the Lord Muskerry (fourth Baron).

The remains were borne from the church through a rhododendron walk adjoining, to the place of interment, a spot almost in the centre of a large field on the estate where a white iron railing already enclosed the remains of a former Lady Muskerry. Beside this grave another had been prepared in concrete, bounded on all sides with timber, and into this the remains were lowered, and at the graveside the committal sentences were read by the Bishop.

The chief mourners were the Dowager Lady Muskerry, the present Lord Muskerry, son of the late Peer, who inherits the title; his brother, Mr Cecil Fitzmaurice Deane-Morgan, Lady Muskerry, and Commander Harman (brother-in-law of the succeeding

Peer).
