**FUNERAL OF MR J. N. RUSSELL.**

At 10 o'clock yesterday morning the funeral of the late Mr John Norris Russell took place from 73 O'Connell street for Ballingrane Cemetery. Russell and Sons, Ltd, of which the deceased gentleman was up to the time of his demise the only surviving member of his family who founded this great milling firm. The journey to Ballingrane was by road, the coffin of the greatest simplicity which encased the remains, was covered with the Union Jack. On reaching its destination the coffin was taken into the Methodist Church, where the service was conducted by the Rev Wm. **MAYORAL ELECTION.**

At a statutory meeting of the Borough Council to be held on Saturday next at noon the election of Mayor will take place. It will, from what has now transpired, provide a contest, but not a thrilling or exciting one. With the withdrawal of Councillor Liam Ford, who was the nominee of the Fianna Fail party, the issue lies between the present holder of the office, Councillor M. J. Keyes, and Alderman J. Reidy, who is the candidate of Cumann na nGaedheal. On Tuesday night a meeting of Alderman Reidy's supporters was held to review the position and ascertain his prospects of election to the office. After an interchange of views it was decided to put him forward. With the Labour Party, some Independents, and Fianna Fail voting for Councillor Keyes, it does not look as if Alderman Reidy can be returned, and with Councillor Keyes being able to count on twenty-two votes it would give him a majority, excluding the candidates for office, who are legally debarred from voting, of seven on the existing personnel of the Council.

**WEST CLARE OUTRAGE.**

**Jury Returns Verdict of Murder.**

That Detective-Officer O'Sullivan met his death by a bomb explosion, and that the bomb was placed for the purpose of his murder, or the murder of others, by some person or persons unknown, at Tullycrine

This verdict was returned at the resumed inquest at Kilrush on the victim of the recent Clare bomb outrage.

The Coroner (Mr T. Lillis) described the crime as a very exceptional and cruel act.

Mr Nagle, Chairman, Kilrush U.C., juror, referred to the widespread indignation the outrage had created, and said Claremen were now ashamed to go outside their own county. It was their duty to stand by the Guards, who protected their lives, property and homes, he added.
