**Bathing Fatality at
Parteen.**

Sister's Rescuer Drowned.

Yesterday afternoon a very tragic bathing
fatality occurred in the Shannon, at Parteen,
Ardnacrusha, when Sheila McCormack, aged
20, lost her life.

Some time about 4 o'clock, deceased, with
her sister Oonagh, aged 18, went to bathe,
and had not long been in the water when
the latter got into difficulties. Her sister, a
non-swimmer, went to the rescue, and in the
attempt was drowned. Oonagh succeeded
in struggling to the bank in an exhausted
condition.

The body was subsequently recovered by
Mr R Holmes close to where the girl
disappeared. She was daughter of Mr
Patrick McCormack, farmer, Castlebank,
Ardnacrusha, with whom, and his family,
the deepest sympathy is expressed.

When the body was brought to shore Dr
Brennan, and the Rev. Father Moloney,
P.P., tried all efforts at resuscitation, but
unhappily without success.

The Inquest.

Mr Patrick Culloo, Coroner for East Clare, and
a jury held an inquest to-day at Castlebank,
Parteen, on the body of the deceased.

Sergeant Staunton, Ardnacrusha, conducted the
enquiry.

The evidence of Oonagh McCormack was that
both went to bathe at Parteen last evening. They
had not been long in the water when the witness
got into difficulties. She heard her sister scream
and saw her come towards her. She did not
recollect anything farther, as she swooned, and
subsequently found herself near the bank, after
recovering and floating for some distance. She
then realised that her sister had been lost.

Mr Robert Holmes, Ardnacrusha, deposed to re-
covering the body of the deceased some short
distance from where he was told she had dis-
appeared.

The testimony of Dr George Enright was that
death was due to asphyxia, caused by drowning.

The jury returned a verdict of death by acci-
dental drowning, and tendered sincere sympathy
with her father and relatives, in which Sergeant
Staunton and the Coroner joined.

It is learned that the two girls had just come
home for the summer vacation from college.
