**BALLINACURRA MOTOR
CYCLING FATALITY.**

Inquest on Victim.

An inquest was opened in Barrington's
Hospital yesterday by the City Coroner, Mr
J. S. McNeipe, and a jury to inquire into
the death of Henry Raleigh, Parnell street,
who succumbed to injuries received on Thurs-
day night, when the motor bicycle on which
he was riding fell from the top of the side-
walk at Ballinacurra.

Inspector Chambers conducted the in-
quiry.
Margaret Henry, 19 Parnell street, city,
identified the body of Henry Raleigh, who
was her nephew and lived with her. He
was twenty-seven years of age, and an un-
married labourer. The deceased left her
own door at 10.20 o'clock on the night of
the accident on a motor bicycle with Patrick
Benson, who was driving.

Dr M. P. Dundon, house surgeon, Bar-
rington's Hospital, stated deceased was ad-
mitted to the hospital at half-past eleven
o'clock on Thursday night. He was then
unconscious and suffering from brain con-
cussion. He had fractured skull, right
lower jaw and left collar-bone, in addition
to lacerated injuries to the forehead, upper
lip, left side of the face and left hand. He
died at 3.40 p.m. on Saturday, without
regaining consciousness. The cause of death
was concussion of the brain and fractured
skull.

Inspector—At the same time was John
Benson admitted?—He came to the hospital
with him.

Inspector—What was his condition?—I
asked him if he was injured, and he said
not, that he did not leave the bicycle.

Inspector—What was his general condi-
tion?—In my opinion the man was sober.

Patrick Galligan, Mungret, deposed that
on the 27th June he was cycling from the
City Home at a quarter to eleven. Coming
around the bend at Ballinacurra he heard a
slight crash, and on approaching he noticed
a man lying on the footpath, and two others
standing over him. Witness did not know
any of the parties, and saw a motor bicycle
thrown on the footpath. He had learned
since that the injured man was Raleigh, and
one of the other two was Benson.

Inspector—What was the condition of
the injured man?—He was covered with
dust and blood, and unconscious.

What was Benson's condition?—He was
wiping his face.

Was he sober?—Yes.

Inspector Chambers applied for an ad-
journment to make further inquiries into
the cause of the accident.

The application was granted, and the in-
vestigation adjourned to Friday, the 9th of
August.

The interment took place on Sunday even-
ing at Ballysimon, the funeral from St.
Michael's Catholic Church being large. It
included representatives of the various rugby
clubs all of which placed wreaths on the
grave.

The chief mourners were the two brothers
of the deceased, and his aunt, Mrs M Henry
and other relatives.

The officiating clergy at the grave were—
Rev. Fr. Thornhill, Adm, and Rev. Fr.
Moriarty, C.C.

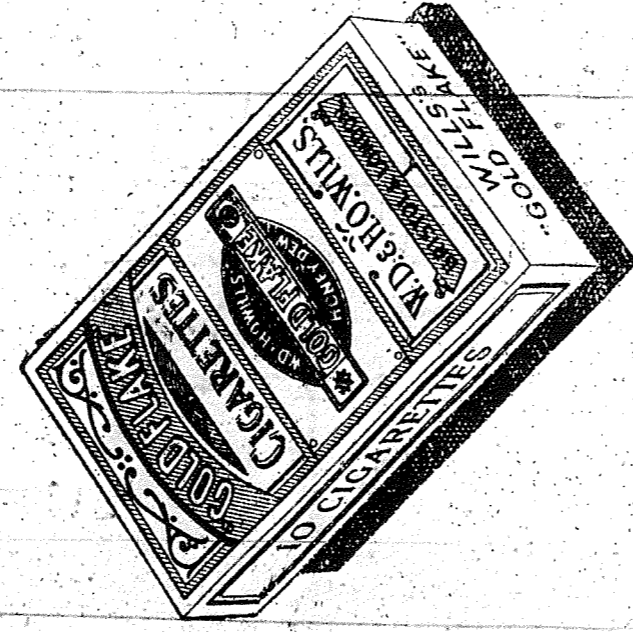
