NEW BRITISH TRUNK CALL SCHEME.

Searching Towns for Persons Wanted.

On August 1 the British Post Office will introduce a new telephone service of "personal calls," which is designed to reduce to the minimum the irritation and financial loss caused when a subscriber making a long-distance call fails to get into touch with the person he wants.

For a small fee, varying in amount according to the distance and the hour at which the personal call is made, the Post Office will search a town for the person wanted. If Exchange fails to find him, only the search fee will be charged. If the search is successful and the call is duly completed, then the subscriber will pay the usual trunk charges plus the search fee.
