The very sad news was received in Limerick yesterday that the Irish priest, who, as stated in a cable received at Omaha, Nebraska, was murdered by Chinese bandits in the district of Kien Chang, in Southern Kiang Si Province, on July 14, was the Rev Timothy P. Leonard, son of Mr William Leonard, Ballysimon, Co. Limerick.

He was a brilliant student in his earlier days at St. Manchin's College, was a Bachelor of Arts, and a member of the Maynooth Mission to China, whither he proceeded in 1920. He was home on holidays in 1925.

Deep sympathy is expressed in Limerick with his parents in their poignant grief.

## NEW BRITISH TRUNK CALL SCHEME.

### Searching Towns for Persons Wanted.

On August 1 the British Post Office will introduce a new telephone service of "personal calls," which is designed to reduce to the minimum the irritation and financial loss caused when a subscriber making a long-distance call fails to get into touch with the person he wants.

For a small fee, varying in amount according to the distance and the hour at which the personal call is made, the Post Office will search a town for the person wanted. If the Telephone Exchange fails to find him, only the search fee will be charged. If the search is successful and the call is duly completed, then the subscriber will pay the usual trunk charges plus the search fee.
