the Countess in a wretched little bed chamber. Later James VI of Scotland stayed at Worksop on his way south to assume the English crown. In after years the manor was honoured by a visit from Charles I.

Worksop came subsequently to the Dukes of Norfolk. In 1761 the Tudor Manor House was destroyed by fire and the ninth Duke of Norfolk began a new mansion, which was to surpass all others in England In 1840 the estate was sold to the Duke of Newcastle. Fifty years later it was bought by the late Sir John Robinson, for whose executors it will be offered by auction in October by Messrs Knight, Frank and Rutley.
