

£3,500 of the sum spent in macadam should be capitalised, and a loan of from £28,000 to £30,000 raised for concreting a considerable area of the city roads. It is calculated that if this loan were spread over a period of twenty years, repayment of principal and interest could be met on the above basis, especially if the loan is obtained on advantageous terms, and there is little doubt that the scheme would have the approval of the Local Government Department. It is a very important project for the city, and its development, we hope towards fruition, will be awaited with interest by the citizens.

DEATH OF MRS SWAIN.

We deeply regret to announce the death which occurred in a Dublin nursing home yesterday morning of Mrs Swain, wife of the Very Rev. the Dean of Limerick. She had been in delicate health for sometime past, but her demise was unexpected, and has been heard of with sincere regret by numerous friends in the city and county of Limerick. A lady of a most kindly and amiable disposition, she was very highly esteemed, and her loss will be felt in parochial organisations, such as the Mothers' Union and the Girls' Friendly Society, as well as charitable work, in which she took a keen interest. Deep sympathy is expressed with the Dean and family in their great sorrow. Mrs Swain was the youngest daughter of the late Ven. F. C. Hamilton, M.A., a former Rector of St. Michael's, and Archdeacon of Limerick, and brother of Brigadier-General Hamilton, R.F.A., and Rev. G. F. Hamilton, Rector of Ballingarry.

The remains were conveyed by motor hearse from Dublin to-day to St. Mary's Cathedral, where the funeral will take place to-morrow morning at nine o'clock.

DEATH OF CAPTAIN R. A. LYONS.

We regret to record the death of Capt. Robert Agar Lyons, formerly of the 2nd Life Guards and Lancashire Fusiliers, which took place at St. Bartholomew's Hospital, London, of which he was Chairman, on the 28th ult. He was a member of an old County Limerick family, being second son of the late William Henry Lyons, J.P., of Croom Castle, Limerick, and brother of Mrs Jack Hartigan, and Mrs P. E. O'Donnell, Limerick, and Mrs Strath, Kildare. Captain Lyons died from double pneumonia, after a short illness, and the funeral took place yesterday in London with full military honours. He was well known in sporting circles, and news of his death will be heard of with deep regret in his native county.
