### DEATH OF MR JAMES GRENE BARRY, J.P.

We regret to announce the death of a venerable and highly respected County Limerick gentleman, Mr. James Greec Barry, J.P., D.L., which occurred at his residence, Sandville, Ballynesty, yesterday, in the 19th year of his uge. Mr Barry, who had been confined to bed for a couple of washer present treasured. weeks, passed peacefully away in the

weeks, passed peacefully away in the presence of his family.

For a very long span of years he was identified with public, life in the city and county. He was probably the oldest manistrate in Treland, having got his commission so far back as 1864, and also the oldest surviving County Grand Juror, having first served on that hidd in 1867. He was onest surviving county Grand Juror, having first served on that body in 1867: He was a Freeman of the City of Limerick, as his eldest soo, Mr James T. Barry, is today, and in his time was an active member of all the Limerick public boards, including the old Board of Guardians.

He was widely known throughout Ireland as an archeologist, and for one less than foots.

### FUNERAL OF LORD INCHIQUIN.

Impressive Service.

Address by Bishop of Killaloe.

The sorrow evoked by the death of the Right Hon. Lucius William O'Brien, 15th Right Hon. Lucius William O'Brien, Toth Buron Inchiquin, received full expression yesterday, not alone from the people amongst whom he lived at this seat, Dromoland Castle, Nowmarket on Fengua, but throughout the County Clare, where he was revered and in Limerick City and County, with which he had family ties. Since his death on Tuesday might the remains, encused in a polished oak coffinirested in room number one, overlooking the majo entrance, and St. Patrick's flag flew at half mast over the Castle. For some hoths before the cortege left for Kilmasoolagh Church, about two miles distant from Dromoland Castle, large numbers commenced to arrive for the funeral, which was of the utmost simplicity, and in that respect befitting the quiet and unobtrusive life led by the late Feer. Country folk were present from the surrounding country-side in large numbers, while there was a large gathering from Ennis which included a representative contingent from the Ennis branch of the British Legion of which the late Loud Inchiquin was President, and took a deep interest in its work and in the wildire of the exceptionnen. The cortege was timed to leave the Castle at one o'clock to a silve of the cotte when the cottin was heartly half an hour later when the cottin was taken out by employees on the was timed to leave the Chatle at one o'clock' upa it was hearly half an hour later when the cofin was taken out by employes on the estate, and carried in relays for a mile distant through the demesme to the Beschwood gate entrance. At this point it was placed on a farm cart drawn by one horse, and taken the remainder of the journey of more than a mile to Killmascolagh, which was not reached until approaching three o'clock. The wreaths, which included beautiful ristural flowers, were conveyed by the workmen, and in a closed carriage behind the ligher. At the entrains to the parish church the remains were berne into the sacred edilice, and placed on treatles in the chancel, and the service immediately commenced.

The late Peer was in the best sense of the term a resident landlord, and a true patriot, as well as a staunch churchman and loyal friend.
