We regret to announce the death of a venerable and highly respected County Limerick gentleman, Mr James Grene Barry, J.P., D.L., which occurred at his residence, Sandville, Ballyneety, yesterday, in the 69th year of his age.

DEATH OF MR JAMES GRENE BARRY, J.P.

For a very long span of years he was identified with public life in the city and county. He was probably the oldest magistrate in Ireland, having got his commission so far back as 1864, and also the oldest surviving County Grand Juror, having first served that body in 1867.

ADMIRAL OF THE FLEET DEAD.

Sir Henry Jackson.

Admiral of the Fleet, Sir Henry Jackson, K.C.B., K.C.V.O., died early to-day at Hasting Island, Hants. Sir Henry joined the Navy as long ago as 1868, when he was thirteen, and retired in 1924.

WRECKAGE WASHED ASHORE

The "Discovery II," the new sailing ship designed for investigating the whaling industry in the Antarctic, left St. Katherine's Dock, London, to-day, for her three years' voyage of research.
