CARDINAL GASPARRI.

Pope Accepts Resignation.

The Pope's acceptance of the resignation of Cardinal Gasparri, the Papal Secretary of State, is expected to be announced now any day, says a Reuter message from Vatican City.

Cardinal Gasparri wished to resign long ago, and again begged to be allowed to give up his office last year, but the Pontiff begged him to remain longer, wishing that the man who had accomplished the great work of the codification of Canon Law should complete the other work already begun of the con- ciliation between Church and State in Italy. The Pope, in agreement with Cardinal Gasparri, has chosen the newly-created Cardinal, Mgr. Pacelli, until recently Papal Nuncio in Berlin, to be the new Secretary of State, but no official announcement has as yet been made.

FUNERAL OF MRS CHARLOTTE HONOR FITZGERALD.

The funeral of Mrs Charlotte Honor FitzGerald, wife of Mr Peter FitzGerald, took place at noon yesterday from Mondellihy, Adare, to the Abbey Cemetery, and was attended by a large concourse of mourners and sympathisers. The remains were removed from the house by employes and deposited in a farm cart drawn by one horse, and preceded by motor cars laden with beautiful wreaths of natural flowers.

The cortege, which was representative of the city and county, included several members of the County Hunt. It proceeded along the avenue to the main road by the Lantern Lodge to the last resting place and was a touching and tangible tribute of respect to the memory of a lady who was held in affectionate regard in Adare and district, and expressed the deep sympathy felt for her popular husband and family in their sorrow.

At the entrance to the cemetery the coffin was taken by the employes to the graveside, where the service was conducted by the Rev. Canon Orpen, Rector of Adare, it having been found impossible to hold a service in the Parish Church, which was flooded, consequent on the recent heavy rainfall.
