FUNERAL OF MR JOHN FALLON.

The funeral of the late Mr John Fallon,

 yesterday at 10.30 a.m. from St. Michael's
 Catholic Church after Office and High Mass.
 The celebrant was Rev J. O'Carroll, C.C.,
 St Michael's; deacon, Rev M. Fitzpatrick,
 C.C., do.; sub-deacon, Rev J. O'Carroll, C.C.,
 St John's; master of ceremonies, Rev Fr.
 Brassil, C.C., do. A large number of the
 clergy were in the choir.

Students of St Munchin's College and the
 Christian Brothers' School marched in the
 funeral to Mount St Lawrence Cemetery.

Amongst the wreaths sent were ones from
 St John's Choir, St John's Temperance
 Society, and the Christian Brothers' boys.
