

as well under consideration, as the Ministry for Local Government views it with favour. We have already referred to the main outlines of the undertaking. It will, if carried out, be a great advantage to the city in providing wide and tidy streets, and a continuation of the sewerage scheme already carried out in the principal thoroughfares. The Corporation is to reduce the rate for water-bound macadam roads, and set aside a certain sum for the redemption of which is fixed at 15 years by the Bank, but the Corporation will save a fifteen years' period. It has been shown that eventually the scheme will bring about a saving in the rates, as the streets created will require no repairs for a long time but a comparatively small outlay in cleansing. From a hygienic point of view, too, it is to be commended. As we have said, provide up-to-date sewerage for the municipality. Of late years we have made marked progress in sewerage, and the citizens will heartily welcome the new development, which will be a boon until the entire city roads are laid out.
