Interviewed in Cork, Mr O. C. Mercier, Managing Director of Messrs. John Furlong and Sons, Ltd., Cork, of which Messrs. Bannatyne's firm are the owners, told a Press representative that a similar arrangement had been come to with regard to his firm. A similar circular, he said, is being prepared.

Government Attitude.

Replying to a Press inquiry in Dublin last night, Mr Ferguson, of the Department of Industry and Commerce, said of the new arrangement:—

"It is an important public question. The Minister for Industry and Commerce is considering the matter, and it would be inopportune at the moment to express any opinion. We ourselves would like to know just what the next move is likely to be."

FATAL ACCIDENT.

An inquest was opened in the County Infirmary by Coroner McMeice and a jury, on Saturday night, on Kate Enright, of Carnane, Fedamore, who succumbed to injuries received the previous Wednesday by being struck by an omnibus travelling in the direction of Limerick.

Inspector Chambers appeared for the Civic Guard authorities.

Evidence of identification having been given,

Dr A. Murnan, house surgeon at the County Infirmary, described the injuries sustained by the deceased. These consisted of fracture of the femur, as a result of which there was extensive blood effusion of the knee joint. Gangrene subsequently set in, which necessitated amputation. Death was due to the injuries received and resultant gangrene.

The inquest was, on the application of the Inspector, adjourned sine die, in view of criminal proceedings being instituted.
