DEATH OF SIR HENRY B LEFROY.

Descendant of an Old Limerick Family.

"The Times" announces the death of the Hon. Sir Henry Lefroy, formerly Agent-General for Western Australia, a few days before the end of his seventy-fifth year.

Henry Bruce Lefroy was born at Perth on March 24, 1854, the eldest son of the Hon. Anthony O'Grady Lefroy, C.M.G., greatgrandson of De Courcy The O'Grady, and of Colonel Anthony Lefroy, 9th Light Dragoons, and grand-nephew of the late Lord Chief Justice Lefroy and Viscount Guillamore, all of County Limerick, who was for 36 years Colonial Treasurer of Western Australia. He came to England to go to Rugby School, and returned to Western Australia where he became a squatter. After serving in local administration, he entered the Legislative Assembly in 1892, and sat till 1901, and again from 1911 to 1921. In 1895-'97 he was a member of the Federal Council of Australasia. He was Minister of Education in 1897-'98, and Minister of Mines from 1898 to 1901. He was then appointed Agent-General in London, and held the post From 1916 to 1919 he was till 1904. Premier of Western Australia, and Minister for Lands and Agriculture. Sir Henry Lefroy—he was created C.M.G. in 1903, and advanced to the K.C.M.G. in 1919—was twice married, and had five sons and one daughter.
