

FUNERAL OF DR. T. K. MULCAHY.

The remains of the late Dr Thomas K. Mulcahy, L.C.P.I. & S.I., whose lamented death we announced in last Saturday evening's issue of the "Chronicle," arrived in Limerick by mail train yesterday morning, and were conveyed to St. Michael's Catholic Church, where after Requiem High Mass the funeral left at 11.45 for Mount St. Laurence Cemetery. The deceased gentleman was a popular personality in the city. He was for many years dispensary medical officer for No. 1 District, including Thomondgate and the Abbey, and was most skilful and active in the discharge of his duties. Kindly, courteous and charitable, he was held in the highest regard and esteem, especially by the poor, and his demise after a long illness patiently borne, is deeply regretted by his professional colleagues and the citizens generally. He belonged to an old Caherdavin family, with whom deep sympathy is expressed in their bereavement. Dr Mulcahy, amongst other appointments, was a member of the visiting staff of St. John's Hospital and other institutions, and doctor for some of the city benevolent societies. The funeral was very large, and representative of the city and surrounding districts.

FISHERY BOARD.

Shannon Scheme Canal— Protection of Fish.

Mr A. E. Bannatyne presided at a special meeting of the Limerick Fishery Conservators yesterday afternoon, called for the purpose of considering what steps should be taken for the protection of salmon and salmon fry entering the intake canal of the Shannon Electricity Scheme.

The other members present were—Messrs M. Johnson, E. J. Gleeson, J. Cronin, A. Mackey, A. O'Levee, S. Whipp, A. O'Sullivan, M. Tobin, J. S. MacNeice, A. Blood-Smyth, F. McKibbin, J. O'Sullivan.

A member said that fishermen had told him that fry and spent salmon had gone into the canal, and if they did they would surely be killed.

Mr Blood-Smyth thought there were not any in the canal yet.

The member said that there were "slats" alright there, and surely the fry would go in.

Mr Blood-Smyth said the fish might go in or might not; it was hard to tell.

Replying to Mr Mackey, the Secretary said he had no report from the Board's Inspector or any bailiff to give any information.

Mr Mackey said it was time the Board did something for the industry and for the people dependent on the fisheries.

The Chairman said that last March he was told the Ministry of Fisheries would erect a fish-guard at the entrance to the intake canal, but apparently he had not done so yet.

The Secretary said that the Inspector had told him that fish-guards had been ordered.

The Chairman said the Board could pass a resolution asking the Minister of Fisheries to supply fish-guards as soon as possible.

Mr McKibbin urged that the resolution be put as strongly as possible.

Mr Blood-Smyth said he had been told that a large bottle could pass through the turbines, and would not be damaged. He considered it was the Electricity Supply Board that had the dealing with the Board. The Ministry of Fisheries were doing their best in the matter.

Mr Johnson said that since last meeting large batches of "slats" passed Killaloe, and fishermen had to leave fishing the river. That showed that the "slats" had gone down, as previous to last meeting none had passed.

Mr McKibbin proposed the following resolution—"That this Board wishes to call the special and immediate attention of the Ministry of Fisheries to the very serious injury that is certain to be caused to the Shannon salmon fisheries by the fact that there are no fry guards on the intake canal at Parteen, and there was nothing there to prevent the salmon-fry coming down the river from being destroyed. As the date for the run of the fry was known the Board considered that these guards ought to have been fitted before this, and considered the failure to do so showed unaccountable neglect
