It is not surprising, all things considered, to read that across the Channel there are many people who would like to see the existing daylight-saving period extended. But this year, as we have seen, there is certainly no cause for grumbling.

## CITY SEWER FATALITY.

### Worker Killed.

A sad accident occurred at Thomondgate to-day involving the death of John Butler, a married labourer, aged about 55 years. It appears that the deceased with others was engaged by Mr Dillon, contractor, Thomondgate, constructing a sewer for the Corporation in the Quarry Road. It was about six feet deep, and as the men were removing some debris the side of the excavation collapsed and practically buried Butler, another worker named Creagh having a narrow escape from the falling rock. When Butler was taken out he was virtually beyond medical aid, and died after receiving the ministrations of the Rev. Fr. Halpin, C.C., St. Munchin's. The body was subsequently conveyed in the Fire Station ambulance to Barrington's Hospital morgue, pending an inquest.

A pathetic feature of the unfortunate accident was that it took place practically outside the house of the deceased.
