Exchange, and portion of the Thames Embankment was lighted by the new power. Time moves swiftly in most things, and it has done so with marvellous reality in the matter of the development of electrical power throughout the world. When will the climax be reached? No one can tell. But at all events, so far as our own country is concerned, the Shannon Scheme is destined to play a great part in the life of the Nation, industrially and otherwise, and we can, therefore, point with pride to this splendid achi wement with its unlimited possibilities for the common weal.
