Tickets which draw horses, whether starters or non-starters, will be worth £750 each.

At their meeting to-day the Turf Club refused subscriptions totalling £38,000, offered presumably by profiteering syndicates in the Dominions, with the object of reselling the tickets at exorbitant prices. Precautious are being taken to prevent the winning numbers becoming known at the draw on Saturday, but already seven syndicates have been formed to buy out successful ticket-holders.—"Daily News" Correspondent.
