Tragic Week-End. DOUBLE TRAGEDY AT KILLALOE.

Young Man Drowned.

Woman Collapses.

A very sad drowning accident occurred at Killaloe on Sunday afternoon. A young man named Michael McMahon, aged 22, victualler, and a native of the town, went for a bathe in Lough Derg and lost his life. The body was recovered later and taken to a house near by, pending an inquest.

At the inquest yesterday, evidence was given which showed that after partaking of dinner McMahon went to bathe in the lough with some companions. He was not long in the water when he was missed, and a search, immediately instituted, resulted in the body being found near the bank in a few feet of water.

Medical testimony attributed death to cardiac failure, and the jury returned a verdict accordingly.

An aunt of the deceased resides in Limerick.

A Distressing Sequel.

There was a distressing sequel to the accidental drowning on Sunday evening, when Mrs Rafferty, a neighbour, collapsed, after visiting the house of the dead man.

She was greatly affected by his death, and on returning home she had a seizure, and died in a short time.

The jury, at the inquest on young McMahon, tendered sympathy with Mrs Rafferty's family.

Young Man Drowned at Lahinch

While bathing at Lahinch, County Clare, at about 4 p.m. on Sunday, Valentine Kenny (19), son of Thomas Kenny, shopkeeper, Corofin, was caught by an undercurrent and drowned.

Two other Corofin youths, Thomas Cahoy and Joseph Brown, were bathing with young Kenny at the time, and the first named made a plucky attempt to rescue the drowning lad.

The body has not so far been recovered.

Mother Sees Daughter Drown.

Owing, it is believed, to the wash caused by a passing liner, Ida Clark, aged twelve, who was bathing at Gurnard Bay, Isle of Wight, on Saturday last, got out of her depth, and was drowned. Her mother, Mrs Stanley Clark, who was sitting on the shore, saw her in difficulties, and rushed into the sea in an attempt to rescue.
