DEATH OF MR P. J. LYNCH, M.R.I.A.

The death, which occurred on Sunday at Adelaide Avenue, Dunlaoghaire, of Mr Patrick J. Lynch removes a gentleman who was for many years closely connected with the advancement of education in this city. Mr Lynch, who was born in Limerick, had reached a remarkably fine age. He was Fellow of the Institute of Architects of Ireland, and a member of the Royal Irish Academy, and Architect to the Board of Works in this city for a number of years. He took a deep interest in Technical Education, and was a member of the local committee, and a member of the Free Library Committee. He was one of the earliest members of the North Munster Archaeological Society and Field Club, and a frequent contributor to the Club Journal. Sometime before the war he retired on pension, and left to reside in Dunlaoghaire, but still kept in contact with his native city, and the educational establishments with which he was associated.
