BRITAIN'S UNEMPLOYED.

The British Ministry of Labour announce that on 23rd June, 1930, the number of persons on the registers of employment exchanges in Great Britain were 1,160,900 wholly unemployed, 562,100 temporarily stopped, and 92,300 normally in casual em ployment, making a total of 1,815,300 This was 70,000 less than on 16th of June 1930, but 697,493 more than a year before,
