The man put out his right hand and immediately turned across the road, almost under the bus. In the attempt to save him the driver swerved the bus across the road to the right.

His Lordship, in his judgment, said he was satisfied that the bus was going at a reasonable rate at the time of the accident, and that the horn was blown at frequent intervals. He was satisfied the driver of the bus did what he considered at the time the only thing possible to avert the accident, and he accordingly decided in favour of the
