**Tragic Roadside Accident.**

**Motor Cyclist Killed.**

A very sad motor accident, attended with fatal results, occurred last Sunday night at Ballycurrine Cross, about a mile and a half at the Adare side of Patrickswell. It appears that a young man named James Morrissey, a motor driver, was returning home to Adare on a motor bicycle, and was accompanied by George Farrell, who was pillion riding. On the way they ran into a cow, and Morrissey received serious injuries to the head and chest. He was removed in a passing motor car to the residence of his aunt, Mrs E. Lynch, Adare, where he was attended by Rev Father Fitzpatrick, C.C., and Dr D. Costelloe. Morrissey died at four o'clock yesterday morning. He was a very popular young man, was aged about 25, and a prominent member of the Adare hurling team. The deepest sympathy is expressed with his relatives in their great sorrow. Farrell escaped injury.

An inquest was held at Adare last evening by Dr Clery, Coroner, Kilmallock.

The jury found a verdict that death was due to concussion and internal hemorrhage, caused by a fall from the motor cycle, and they expressed sympathy with the relatives of the deceased.

Mr William A. Rodenberg, ex-Congress for Illinois, U.S.A., who has toured Ireland independently with Senator Reed, said that he was impressed with the progress made.
