UNEMPLOYMENT PROBLEM.

To the present no effective cure has been found for unemployment, which is still far from solution. Although various propositions have been advanced, the figures continue to mount in Britain, where the situation is much more acute than in this country. In England protective tariffs are regarded to be the only method of reducing the numbers on the dole, and those who advocate that weapon are convinced that it will be effectual and bring about a change for the better. Whatever may be said against the policy of the Empire Free Trade and its application to Britain, it must benefit Ireland, inasmuch as we have only one customer for our produce, and any legislation that is going to ensure that this customer is going to require more meat, butter, and eggs, cannot fail to increase our export trade. That is the question for this country to consider in the matter of Empire Free Trade, and the Irish Cattle Traders and Stockowners' Association may be given credit for knowing something of the conditions that will follow if a change in Britain's fiscal policy takes place in the near future. At a meeting of that important body, held during the week in Dublin, a resolution was passed in favour of Empire Free Trade, and an interesting suggestion was also put forward by Senator Coughlin, that if the forthcoming Imperial

DEATH OF REV. S. A. O'KELLY, O.P.

The death occurred at the Convalescent Home of the Sacred Heart, Milford, Limerick, on Thursday night, of Rev. Stephen A. O'Kelly, O.P., after an illness of four months, in his sixty-fifth year. The deceased was a native of Tralee, where he received his early education at the Christian Brothers Schools, after which he entered the Order of St. Dominic, and was ordained in Rome forty-two years ago. He was Prior of several houses in Ireland, and was for many years on the Australian Mission.

Father O'Kelly was attached to the Community in Limerick for a number of years, and was a well-known preacher.

At 9 o'clock last night the remains were removed from Milford to St Saviour's Church where Requiem Mass was celebrated at 11 o'clock this morning for the soul of the dead Dominican in presence of a large congregation, by the Very Rev. Fr. Muckian, O.P., Prior.

At the close the interment took place in the Church crypt, Fr. Muckian officiating.
