

**JOHN McCORMACK'S**

St. John's Temperance Hall

Next Monday Night.

As early as announced, John McCormack, the Irish tenor, will appear in person at the Temperance Hall, Mulgrave Street, on Monday evening at eight o'clock. The night at Messrs. Pigott's, O'Connell Street, to-day (Saturday) been very heavy, and few seats are available in the stalls, while a limited number of good stage seats to a special price. Those anxious to take advantage of this wonderful opportunity of a life-time to hear the world's greatest singer of songs are advised to take the earliest opportunity of securing their seats before it is too late. As early as announced, Count McCormack sang in two concerts this week to over four thousand people, crowds having to be turned away, and was again the experience in Waterford on Monday night. He is looking forward with pleasure to singing in Limerick and to making an acquaintance after an absence of 30 years. At Monday evening's concert he will sing a number of Irish ballads, including the "Derry Air," "The Snowy Breasted Pearl," "Kathleen Mavourneen," and "The Snowy Breasted Pearl." He will arrive in Limerick early on Monday in order to rest in preparation for the concert.

**GRAND CENTRAL.**

McCormack in "Song o' My Heart."

The celebrated film, which has been the rage in Dublin, is coming to the Grand Central on Monday, and its patrons are on the tip-toe of expectation to see it. No one should lose time in securing seats. There will be three performances on Monday at 3.15, 6.45, and 9 p.m. In this delightful lyrical romance, Mr. McCormack sings a number of his most famous, as well as many never before sung by him, in English, and one in Irish. It may be mentioned that the songs are—"Then you'll remember me," "A Song by the fire," "Just for to-day," "I love you," "Kitty my love," "The Rose Tree," "Lough Sereni E Cari," "Little Ireland," "Ireland, Mother Ireland," "I hear you singing me," and "A pair of blue eyes." The manner of presentation of the songs is unique in the fact that they form a part of the story, and advance the action as they are sung. The lyrics of some of these songs take the form of dialogue, and aptly interpret the plot of the "Song o' My Heart." It is an early picture of the screen, which possesses a wistful charm, a simplicity, and is rich in Irish wit.

**MENTAL HOSPITAL TRAGEDY**

**Patient's Death.**

A distressing tragedy occurred in Limerick Mental Hospital yesterday, involving the death of a patient named Thomas Brosnahan, unmarried, aged sixty years. The deceased, who was a native of Mountcollins, Abbeyfeale, was admitted to the institution last month. After dressing yesterday morning he was standing in a corridor, when he was accused by a patient named Patrick O'Shea of taking his trousers. O'Shea, as alleged, struck Brosnahan with his clenched hand on the chest, and in falling the latter came down heavily on the tiled floor, and sustained fracture of the base of the skull, to which he succumbed some short time subsequently, after being attended in the institution infirmary by Dr. O'Brien, temporary assistant medical superintendent.

An inquest was opened last evening by Mr J. S. McNeice, City Coroner, when evidence of identification was given by Dr P. J. Irwin, Resident Medical Superintendent.

Evidence as to the cause of death was given by Dr O'Brien, and on the application of Inspector Chambers, who conducted the enquiry, the proceedings were adjourned for six weeks, with a view to a possible criminal charge being preferred against O'Shea, who is a native of the city.
