Trying Time in East Limerick.

FATAL CYCLING ACCIDENT.

A cycling accident which has ended fatally occurred at Pallaskenry last Tuesday. It appears that Mr Patrick O'Grady, aged 40, son of Mr Patrick O'Grady, of Rosmadda, Parteen, was cycling to his farm at Pallaskenry where he came into collision with a motor car, and receiving serious injuries had to be removed to Croom County Hospital. His condition became gradually worse during the week and he died in the Institution on Friday night. Deceased was very highly respected and esteemed, and there is widespread sympathy with his relatives in their sorrow. The funeral took place on Monday at 1 o'clock after High Mass at Parteen Church for Mount St. Lawrence, and was very large and representative.

At the inquest held at the County Home on Saturday evening, a verdict was returned that death was due to fracture of the base of the skull. The driver of the car was exonerated from all blame.

THE LATE MR. WM. HEALY, SOLICITOR, ENNIS.

Tribute by Judge McElligott.

At the Ennis Circuit Court, His Lordship Judge McElligott, K.C., said he had to allude to a matter which affected them all very deeply indeed—the loss of their friend the late Mr Wm Healy, who had for many years acted in a primary official position in legal circles. It only seemed a few weeks ago since he said good-bye to him in that court, and it filled him with sadness that he was now no longer with them. Every practitioner in the county esteemed the late Mr Healy most highly, and they missed him very much.

"I certainly do," said his lordship. "To me he was invariably kind, helpful, and hospitable, and I feel his loss intensely. Every barrister and solicitor who ever practised in this county maintained nothing but the utmost regard and affection for him, and to these and the bereaved family I offer my sincere sympathy."

Mr W. H. Cox, B.L., Mr Lynch, State Solicitor, and Mr Killeen, County Registrar, associated themselves with the remarks of the Judge regarding the late Mr Healy, who for many years was Clerk of the Crown and Peace and later Circuit Court Registrar
