PENNY POST URGED.

Resolutions dealing with increasing national and local expenditure; urging the reduction of the penny post, and condemning certain branches of municipal trading, were passed by the Conference of the National Chamber of Trade at Leamington. The Plymouth Chamber of Trade moved a resolution that profits of the Post Office should be devoted to the reduction of postal rates or the improvement of the service, no diversion to other objects being had, and unsound finance. The resolution was adopted.

Condolence of Limerick Corporation.

At the meeting of Limerick Corporation last night, the Mayor (Ald. P. Donnellan) alluded to the R101 disaster, which, he said, was a terrible calamity, and had aroused world-wide regret and sympathy. He proposed—"That this Corporation, representing the citizens of Limerick of all classes, hereby joins with the entire civilised world in expressing its sympathy with the families and relatives of the unfortunate victims of the recent disaster to the airship R101, and its regret at the loss of so many promising young lives prematurely cut off under such terribly appalling circumstances."

The resolution was passed unanimously, all the members present standing.

CHILD'S STRANGE DEATH.

Fall From Caravan.

The death under peculiar circumstances, took place in the County Infirmary on Monday night of Mary Anne Rielly, aged two years, the daughter of a travelling horse dealer. It appears that Rielly, with his wife and family, lived in caravan on the Fair Green, Mulgrave street, and on Sunday the child stumbled out through the door and fell on a hook from which she was suspended by the head. The father was promptly on the scene, and having released her took her to the County Infirmary, where she was attended by the Resident Surgeon Dr Annie Murnane, who had her detained. Her condition grew worse, and she died in the institution twenty-four hours later.

An inquest was held by Mr J. S. McNeice, City Coroner, and a jury, when the medical evidence showed that death was due to fracture of the skull accidentally sustained, and a verdict accordingly returned.
