CITY MOTOR FATALITY,

Boy Succumbs to Injuries.

While William Keehane, aged seven years, was crossing Clare street on Thursday night, he was struck by a motor car stated to have been driven by Mr Charles Stenson, an engineer employed on the Shannon Power Scheme. In the impact the boy sustained grave injuries to the head, and died yesterday morning in Barrington's Hospital. The deceased was son of Patrick Keehane, a labourer, living in Chapel Lane, Upper Clare street, and the address of Mr Stenson is given as 79 Thomondgate.

Inquest Opened.

An inquest was opened in Barrington's Hospital last night by Mr. J. S. McNeice, solr, Deputy Coroner, into the circumstances under which the boy met his death?

Se geant Higgins conducted the enquiry.

After givi g evidence f identification, Timothy Keehane, labourer, Chapel Lane, Upper Clare Street, stated that the deceased, who was his son, was seven years of age. He saw him at 6.30 on Thursday evening, while returning from work, on the pathway ofitside St. Patrick's Church. He was less than ten minutes in his house when he received word, that the boy had been knocked by a motor car, and immediately went to the place. He saw a motor car in Clare Street, occupied by two men, who had the boy in the car. The child appeared to be injured, and was taken in the car to Barrington's Hospital, whither witness accompanied him. When he reached the site of the accident the engine of the motor car was running.

Dr T. A. Morris, House Surgeon at Barrington's Hospital, stated the deceased was admitted at 6.45 on Thursday evening. He was then semiconscious, and or making an examination of him he found that he was suffering from facial abrasions, a small wound under the right ear, and a contusion on the top of the head. He lapsed into a state of unconclousness a short time subsequently, and died at 7.30 yesterday morning. Death was, in witness's opinion, due to fracture of the vault of the skull.

The Deputy Coroner, on the application of Sergeant Higgins, adjourned the enquiry for a month in view of criminal proceedings being taken against the driver, who was later charged with

contributing to the death of the boy, and remanded on bail to the City District Court on next Friday.
