

various Continental cities. For months past negotiations have been in progress between the principal British Railway Companies and Imperial Airways, Ltd., respecting the scheme, which will enjoy considerable State aid. It is announced that the first route to be opened early in the New Year, will be Holyhead and Dublin, Dover (or Folkestone) and Paris, Hull and Holland, Harwich and The Hook. It will be possible to take a parcel to the railway station at any of one hundred provincial towns in Britain and book it direct by rail or air for its Continental destination. It is explained that an air-rail service between Ireland and Paris would mean a saving of at least a day, and thus it should considerably develop our mercantile activities with foreign countries. It is the biggest move yet on the part of the English Railway Companies to control the speediest transport system for light goods; but the new service will, it is stated, not be available for passenger traffic. Details of the scheme, which is approaching completion, will be awaited with interest not alone across Channel but in this country as well.

ARMISTICE DAY.

Armistice Day, for the twelfth time since the European War ended, was observed to-day throughout Great Britain and Ireland.

In St. Mary's Cathedral, Limerick, this morning, at 10.50, a short service was held, and it was numerously attended.

The Limerick Protestant Young Men's Association observed the two minutes' silence to-day. A wreath was placed at the foot of the War Memorial, the Hall door was closed, and all blinds drawn down during the observance.

DEATH OF MR F. J. B. GUBBINS, KILFRUSH.
