pansion of their trade, and supplemented this to the effect that labour must share in that expansion. It is well to have such expression of opinion at a time when we are too prone to take a pessimistic view of the national welfare and outlook. The spirit of optimism is well worth cultivating, and Limerick has a lessen to learn in this respect from the neighbouring City of Cork, which is standing up manfully in the tackling of her problems.

RESCUE FROM DROWNING AT KILKEE.

Bravery Recognised.

An official announcement by the Royal Humane Society says: - Frederick Robinson, 35, of Derryguile, Marlboro' road, Glenageary, Co Dublin, and Edward Connaughton, 33, Wickham street, Limerick, have each been awarded the Society's Bronze Medal for having saved from drowning at Kilkee, Co. Clare, on 21st August, Joan McNamara, 15, of 5 Grattan Villas, The girl was bathing in the sea, Limerick. which was very rough, and being caught by the current she was quickly swept out some 70 yards. Robinson, who has only one leg. swam out to her, but was unable to bring her in, and could only help to keep her afloat. Connaughton, to whom a lifebuoy was thrown, swam out to them and got both to hold on to the buoy, while he took a rope and after a hard struggle managed to reach land, and they were then pulled in.

EMIGRATION FROM FREE STATE.

Decline Continues.

The number of emigrants from the Free State in the first 9 months of 1930 was 13,869, as compared with 16,797 in the corresponding period last year. Of the total 12,364 went to U.S.A., 996 to Canada, 214 to Australia, and 295 to other places out of Europe.
