Answering counsel, the witness said the statement was made on the 30th September. He was present when the accused asked to make a second statement the same evening. In evidence, Sergeant O'Mahony stated he

visited Mrs McGrath's shop and found the coins produced. In a statement by Hilliard he said that Mahony, Collins, and himself went to Boher, where they had some drink. Mahony asked Hilliard if he had enough money, and gave him a few sixpences with which he stood a drink. After leaving the licensed premises Mahony is alleged to have said to Hilliard—" Did you know that was bad money I gave you," and the reply was "No, but if that is so, you had better drop that game." Mahony's response was—"I only made a few of them." The statement continued-"We then went to Brittas, where we went into a publichouse and Mahony and Collins stood a drink each. After coming out Mahony said he passed bad money there.'

Albert Leadbeather, jeweller, Essex street, Dublin, giving expert evidence, stated, he made an examination of the coins (produced) and found them to be base and counterfeit. They were very crudely made coins,

His Lordship—The Ardnacrusha gentlemen made a better coin.

The Witness-Yes, much better. These were made in the one mould. His Lordship-What case is there, Mr

Power? Mr Power-He admitted, probably in nocently, that he uttered the coins.

By direction of the judge, the accused was found not guilty and discharged.

STEEL INDUSTRY.

The total output of Germany's steel-rolling mills in the month of October was 622,617 metric tons, as against 576,948 tons in the previous month, says Reuter's Cologne correspondent. This is the first time for some months that the output figures have shown an upward tendency. In October of 1929 the total output was 927,217 metric tons. In the first ten months of the current year the total output was 7,093,898 metric tons, as against 9,621,248 metric tons in the corressponding ten months of last year, a reduction of more than 25 per cent.
