The Streets.

Pedestrians have reason to complain, as very many of them do, of the s'imy condition of the city flagways. It is difficult to move along in this moist, damp weather, and a more vigorous application of the brush would have the effect of keeping the footways in a tidier condition. Warning to Cyclists.

The frequent disregard for the law relating to lighted vehicles was mention dat the City District Court yesterday by Superintendent Stack. The breach of the law, the Superintendent stated, was not confined to any particular type of vehicle, but was common to all, and applied, if a distinction was to be drawn, in a special way to push bicycles. District Justice Flood remarked that in future offences the penalties would be substantially increased, adding that reckless cycling is a great danger, and he had received several complaints from people who run the risk of being knocked down, even on the footpaths, by cyclists. There is good reason for Mr Flood's admonition, and it is to be hoped it will have the desired effect.

LIMERICK BOY'S TRAGIC DEATH IN AMERICA.

Mr Liam Forde, B.C., Corbally, manager of the Lax Weir Fishing Co., has received news that his nephew, Thomas, has been accidentally shot dead in America. It appears that young Forde, with his father, Mr Patrick J. Forde, and a small party, were deer stalking in the Aderondick Mountains last month, when the boy, disregarding instructions, left an assigned position, and coming into the line of fire, while screened by bushes he received a shot in the back, which terminated fatally. The poignant aspect of the tragedy is that it is believed the fatal shot was fired by the boy's father, who has been resident in Albany during the past twenty years, where he has been engaged in the motor business, employing upwards of two hundred hands.
